ON EXHIBIT

PICTURE PREFECT

is comprised of paintings, photographs and sculptures by artists of stylistically, metaphorically and functionally disparatebut by no means dissonant sensibilities.

The underlying premise of the work in PICTURE PREFECT is that all of the images are derived from a figurative base, usually that of the human form, but not necessarily constructed to the figure. The use of the figure (or, its associative referents) is used as a vehicle for singular metaphors particular to each artist: Myth (Arnoldo, Huggins); Symbol (Finneran, Stiller-Dawson); and image (Floersch, Orcott).

The artists and curator live and work in Buffalo.

STEPHEN FRAILEY

his photographs are made by a combination of objects placed on two dimensional illustrations found in sporting, medical and religious journals of the 20's, 30's and 40's. The illustrations are then rephotographed producing spacial and symbolic tensions: A boot placed across Jesus' face, a strip of meat floating across an illustration of factory workers and a chicken wing nestled between the legs of a hillbilly.

Stephen Frailey lives and works in New York City.

PERRY HOBERMAN's

slide installation OUT OF THE PICTURE/The Return of the Invisible Man is a remake of the film The Invisible Man. Hoberman transforms the space with the use of four alternating projectors and sound. Images of the invisible man are projected on the screen. The spectator with the use of three dimensional glasses becomes part of the manipulation of "presence and non presence in the cinematic situation." (Valerie Smith, Artists

This exhibition/installation was first exhibited at Artists Space, NYC, winter 1983. Part of this project will be released in 3D book form by this summer. At HALLWALLS, OUT OF THE PIC-TURE will be expanded to include a sound track.

In a collaboration with MEL CARPENTER, Duffy will present a video performance that displays the practice of TV-a square look at life in a box. Duffy will also screen some of his recent video work.

Of his work Michael says, "It has recently attempted to reproduce aspects of popular TV shows, reproducing them not with authenticity in mind, rather to allow a critical reading to develop of certain institutions of regular TV programming."
