
In an earnest attempt to justify the consequences of his metamorphosis, the arcane scientist Seth Brundle of **David Cronenberg's** The Fly conjures a hybrid raison d'etre by acknowledging his own rational character as a human being as well as the often violent, irrational character he is becoming. Brundel's body, as a result, becomes a representational conflict that stands as the primary focus for *Insect Politics: Body Horror/Social Order*.

The recent proliferation of discourses centered on the body requires a redefinition of the body and its representation. This delirious assembly of works addresses social concepts while engaging transgressive, mutated signs of the body as a territory in which the imaginary and the real collide, creating multifluous relationships and identifications. Positing a socio-political counterbody, this exhibition develops an aesthetics of mutation and abnormality which contests begemonic ideologies, privileged property, and good taste.


This exhibition has been organized by artist Steve Derrickson and will be accompanied by a catalogue.



INSECT POLITICS MAN OR MACHINE?

A series of films

March 17—March 22

"Monsters are disturbing to people because they appear contrary to Nature, but monsters are obviously part of nature and it is only our understanding which is limited." —Aristotle

"INSECT POLITICS examines political allegories of the body and its extensions. The body in this sense is the beginning of politics. The constitution of the body as both subject and object is crucial to the reproduction of social formations. INSECT POLITICS is about the transformation of representation of the body in society."—Steve Derrickson, Curator of Insect Politics: Body Horror/Social Order Gallery Exhibition

The history of simple tools is a chronology of extensions and articulations of human functions. Tools, originally conceived about two million years ago as crude adjuncts of the body to increase power and efficacy, are passive participants in accomplishing work.

A machine is merely a supplement limb; this is the be-all and end-all of machinery.

Tools connected in series produce machines. Machinery has gone a step beyond the tool in that it is capable of varying degrees of automatism (self-regulated activity without human participation), contingent human behavior (decision-making), and reaction to sensory stimulus through artificial organs. Mechanical history involves not only extension but replacement of human activity. You might say that the extension of the limbs evolved into extensions of the brain.

ILS EGT

We perceive our iron creatures with both fear and euphoria: the machine as saviour and the machine as killer. The machine is an object of projection of our inner wishes and fears. The basic motivation to invent and to use technology is to soothe our fears and to fulfill our wishes. This is why the two most important sources of technological developments today are irrational mega-machines: the military and the space exploration program. The one as a prototype of all fear-machines, the other as the new model of the wish-machine, promising even eternal life for the space traveller.

This film series meditates on machines throughout history, machines in myths. It studies machines in places we might otherwise not look—in religion and in the military, where human individuality is systematically suppressed. It asks why man continues to fabricate ever-more complicated machines, in hopes, perhaps, of one day merging with them himself, as he does, for example in *Robocop*.

The title of the film series and of the gallery exhibition curated by Steve Derrickson is taken from a line in David Cronenberg's series-opening film, The Fly: "Insects do not have politics... I want to be the first insect politician. I would like to, but I'm afraid."

MIRACLES OF THE FLESH

an evening with Hank Hyena

Saturday, March 17 11:00 p.m., \$5/\$3 members San Francisco artist Hank Hyena's world is packed with cheap special effects, motorized dummies, ridiculous rhyming couplets, homemade musical instruments, and giant puppets, which he uses to explore "deformations, disasters, diseases, and other 'miracles' of the physical body." Consider this random sample of his works:

The Reluctant Cock—a hen is trapped in a rooster's body
Eskimo Rhoids—embarassing blister plagues Arctic tribe
Lament of the Circumcised Man—who took my foreskin, and why?
Anarchist's Vomit—Italian folktale about a boy who pukes on authority figures
Porcupine's Lament—do hedgehog cuddles end in bloody puddles?
Barbie's Clitoris—Ken can't find the invisible organ of his plastic girlfriend

Hyena explores the taboo territory where the human body refuses to function the way we want it to, where failures of the flesh govern social behavior. This late-night encounter, presented in conjunction with the *Insect Politics* exhibition and film series, is certain to provoke laughter, disgust, embarassment, and awe: in short, a microcosm of human experience.

The stations of the cross, episode after episode, truths are concealed bit by bit. In March, the walls of the Vault will be tainted with the personal curios and obscured remains of the war for personal and domestic origin. Condemned to leisure spectacle, surrounded by an excess of cultural evidence, series begets spin-off begets the movie, while perpetrator begets victim begets perpetrator. Complicity is the essential agent of (trans)formation. This piece features likeable figures and hideous deeds from the cult of denial.

SPOKEN MUSIC

Featuring Dick Higgins, Jackson Mac Low, Petr Kotik, Ben Neill, with The S.E.M. Ensemble

The Spoken Music concert will examine the border between music and poetry. The works performed are pieces which use words and other speech sounds in a musical and poetic way, often characterized as "sound poetry" or "concrete poetry." Featured in this performance will be Dick Higgins-the renowned "inter-media" artist and co-founder of "happenings," Fluxus, and Something Else Press-and Jackson Mac Low-another of the major innovators of "sound poetry" and multi-media performance pieces.

A highlight of the concert is Letters to Olga (1989/90), by Petr Kotik, which sets to music letters by recently-named Czechoslovaklan President Vaclav Havel written to his wife while he was serving a prison sentence for political activities during 1979-82. Ben Neill's Money Talk (1986) is a work for his self-styled "mutantrumpet," electronics, and percussion in which the voice of a hillbilly auctioneer interacts with other musical elements. Also included on the program are Emmett Williams' Celler Song for Five Voices (1962), Higgens' The Sound of Animals Dying Thirteen to One (1957/58) and Quartet (1989), and Mac Low's The Happy Birthday, Anne, Vocabulary Gatha (1981) and Low

Once again Hallwalls is co-sponsoring with the Music Department of the State University of New York at Buffalo, the North American New Music Festival, presenting works from 1920 to 1990. This year's festival highlights include music by performers from London to Tokyo, from Prokofleff to Sun Ra, from a La Monte Young retrospective to the eclectic improvisations of the Montreal Duo of Jean Derome and Rene Lussier. Also, two programs with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra, works by controversial composer Gordon Monahan, an evening of Film for Music for Film by Lawrence Brose, and a self-contained installation housed in a prefabricated storage shed entitled The Great Indoors by media artist Laura Kikauka, plus much more.

THE GREAT INDOORS LAURA KIKAUKA

Multi-media installation in Hallwalls' Gallery Opening Reception: Saturday, March 17, 9 p.m. Continuing through April 12, during gallery hours

Laura Kikauka's The Great Indoors is an artificial electro-biological environment, reflecting man-made nature—a self-contained installation housed in a pre-fabricated storage shed. At first appearance, this shed stands absurdly out of context in an art gallery or public space. On closer appearance, odors and sounds emitting from the shed provoke the viewer's curiosity to enter the shed. Inside is an entirely synthetic forest-an electronic bog-an interactive environment, slightly dark and steamy. Every step taken by the viewer triggers various devices: bubbling mud, croaking frogs, pine scent spray, and waterfalls. Fireflies randomly dart and pulsate, other animals and insects surface, all according to the viewer's interaction.

Kikauka is a new media artist who uses video, computers, electronics, performance, and appropriated objects to achieve a provocative synthesis in her work. Born in 1963 in Hamilton, Ontario, she spent much of her time as a child drawing, painting, and taking things apart, always fascinated by the look of electronic components. She pursued these interests at the Ontario College of Art, where she studied applied technology and multi-arts. Kikauka has exhibited her work internationally, and since graduating, has returned to OAC to lecture and teach part-time.

FILM FOR MUSIC FOR FILM LAWRENCE BROSE

GORDON MCNAHAN

SUN RA ARKESTRA

Poet/prophet/keyboardist/composer/bandleader, Sun Ra is an approximately 75year-old big band leader who claims he is from Saturn. On Earth, his amazing musical career has spanned the last 50 years : pre-swing bands in his home state of Alabama, floor shows in Chicago night clubs, free improvisation in New York City, performance art incorporating dance and videos, hard bop, and free jazz. He formed his first Arkestra in Chicago in the 1950s, and thirty years later, the core of the Arkestra remains, still producing jazz sounds of the future.

Guest curator/audio artist Paul Dickinson transforms the Video Viewing Room into the Audio Listening Room as he scours the slimy underbelly of the home taping scene to compile Put Down Your Pencil-an audio installation and cassette distribution project produced through Hallwalls

With the development of home multi-track recording technology in the early seventies, it became possible for artists interested in the creative possibilities of audio (as opposed to music) to pursue these ideas outside the institutionalized confines of the educational system or the recording industry. With multi-track cassette technology rapidly increasing in quality while decreasing in price (the TEAC Portastudio sold for \$1100 in 1979now much higher quality units are selling for under \$400), these home tapers are as diverse as they are numerous, with thousands of "cassette only" releases being produced every month.

Put Down Your Pencil focuses on works produced in this context which make use of cast-off educational and motivational aids and simulated appropriations. It is through this recontextualization of appropriated materials that many audio artists have been working to mine (and undermine) the various sub-texts of mediated learning, the omniscient voice of knowledge, and "expert" testimony. That this critique of education as a consumer commodity comes from a sub-culture which exists in opposition to yet another commodity structure (the record industry) suggests a more fundamental problem, one that assumes a cultural hegemony through marketing control.

Put Down Your Pencil includes works by the Tape Beatles, Tiny Kingdom, The Backyard Mechanics for Language, William Thayer, and a host of other flea-bitten mongrels of the (cottage) recording





\$21,000 IN GRANTS AVAILABLE TO NEW YORK STATE ARTISTS FOR PROJECTS IN "NEW FORMS"

For the fourth consecutive year, Hallwalls will be administering a program of grants for innovative artists' projects in the visual, media, literary, and creative performing arts with funds provided jointly by the Rockefeller Foundation and the Inter-Arts Program of the National Endowment for the Arts. Hallwalls is one of 13 organizations across the nation chosen to distribute these funds to artists in 49 states, Puerto Rico, and D.C., as part of the newly rechristened *New Forms Regional Initiative*.

Formerly called the "Grant Program for Interdisciplinary Artists," grants this year are being offered for projects in "New Forms." Interdisciplinary and collaborative projects are still a priority of this program, but only one priority among several. The revised designation "New Forms" also embraces ground-breaking single-discipline projects and projects by individual artists which use contemporary or traditional arts media innovatively, or which address emerging currents in the arts or society. Another explicit goal of the program is that projects funded and artists served should reflect the cultural diversity of the nation as a whole and of each region in particular. As such, projects by artists working innovatively or in contemporary terms with specifically ethnic or folk forms, as well as creative multi-cultural collaborations across genres and disciplines, are especially encouraged. Projects of research and development in emerging arts technologies are also a priority of this program.

In past years, Hallwalls administered this program in Ohio and West Virginia, as well as upstate New York. In 1990 the regions have been redrawn so that Hallwalls now serves New York State only, but the entire state of New York, with the exception of the five boroughs of NYC proper. This means that artists in Long Island and other downstate areas in proximity to NYC previously excluded are now eligible to apply. Hallwalls hopes to reach artists in the cities and rural regions of Western New York, central New York (including the Finger Lakes), upstate (including the Catskills, Capital District, Adirondacks, and Canadian border region), Yonkers and other downstate communities outside the five boroughs, and the entire length of Long Island from the suburbs to Montauk. Since the five boroughs of NYC, with the world's densest population of artists, will be included in the 1991 New Forms Regional Initiative, without a commensurate increase in the total funds available statewide, 1990 is the best chance the state's artists outside NYC have to receive support.

Eight to fifteen grants will be awarded, ranging in amount from \$1,000 to \$3,000, for a total of \$21,000. THE APPLICATION DEADLINE FOR THIS PROGRAM IS TUESDAY, MAY 29, 1990. HALLWALLS AWARDED \$10,000 GRANT FROM MACARTHUR FOUNDATION

Hallwalls is pleased to announce that it has been awarded \$10,000 from the prestigious John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation through its Media Arts Centers Assistance Program. The MacArthur Foundation is a private, independent, grant-making foundation created in 1978 for charitable and public service purposes and to act as a catalyst for change.

Applications for funding are accepted by invitation only, and competition is extremely rigorous. In addition to its Media Arts Centers Assistance Program, the Foundation funds several other programs such as The MacArthur Fellows Program, The Health Program, The International Security Program, and The World Environment and Resources Program. Other recepients of MacArthur support include National Public Radio and The MacNeil-Lehrer News Hour.

Hallwalls will use its award to purchase and service equipment for its film, video, and cable tv programs and to help cover general operating and salary expenses. The new large-screen video projector, which debuted to much acclaim last month during the Video Witnesses Festival, was one addition made possible, in part, with the MacArthur Foundation funding. In addition, a Xenon Super 8 film projector will also be purchased, reaffirming Hallwalls' position as one of the nation's foremost supporters of independent media.

HALLWALLS BOARD NEWS

The latest addition to the Hallwalls Board of Directors is Richard E. Clark, Western New York Regional Director of the New York State Division of Human Rights. He was elected to the Board, along with twelve previously appointed or returning members, at the annual membership meeting in November.

No sooner did last month's calendar go to press than we learned that former Hallwalls development intern Kimberty Smith had already moved on from her position at Just Buffalo to new challenges as Coordinator of the Minority and Women Owned Business Enterprise Program of the Lackawanna Community Development Corporation. In her position as Coordinator, Kim will be responsible for the "development of business programs and services to stimulate the growth of minority and women owned enterprises in the state sponsored economic development zone." Kim, a resident of Lackawanna, worked at Hallwalls in 1988-89.

In another update of announcements in the last calendar, video artist Julie Zando and the other Buffalo artists (including Hallwalls video co-curators Chris Hill and Barbara Lattanzi) who had threatened to withdraw their work from The State of Upstate: New York Women Artists—the exhibition which premiered at the New York State Museum in Albany—reached a satisfactory accomodation with the staff of the museum over issues surrounding the presentation of Julie's work and decided to let their work remain in the museum for the duration of the exhibition. No sooner was that victory in the ongoing censorship struggle won than the next attack was launched, this time by a Saratoga Springs assemblyman who used Julie's work in the Albany museum as the occasion to suggest legislation that would prohibit state funding of "pornographic" art. Julie herself and arts advocates throughout the state are mobilized. Meanwhile, see the work for yourself opens at the Burchfield Center where The State of Upstate opened in late February, before it travels to the National Museum of Women in the Arts in Washington, D.C.

Hallwalls film curator Jurgen Bruning spent February at various international festivals, including his home base of Berlin for the Berlin Film Festival, where he presented filmmakers and films for the International Forum for Young Filmmakers, and the Philippines, where he had been invited to curate and present a program of German films for the Manila Super-8 Festival. Exhibitions Curator Charles Wright recently traveled to Cincinnati, having been invited to serve on the art selection panel for CAGE (Cincinnati Artists Group Effort), that city's artist-run organization.
