# Office Killer

Office Killer marks the directorial debut of Cindy Sherman, one of the most influential photographers working today. While her international reputation grows out of her groundbreaking Untitled Film Stills photo series (begun in Buffalo in the late 1970s and recently purchased by the Museum of Modern Art for a record sum), we in Buffalo knew her first as a Buff State art student and one of the original group of Hallwalls artists. Office Killer is an art-house horror film/black comedy about corporate downsizing at a consumer magazine office and the devastating impact it has on an introverted office worker, Dorine Douglas (Carol Kane), who responds violently to the newly reconfigured home/work economy. The film also stars Jeanne Tripplehorn and Molly Ringwald. "Office Killer uses rich and stylized visuals, reverberating with Sherman's photographic work, to create a binarized world of the corporate office and spinster's domicile. It is a story whose graphic linkage of serial killing and postmodern urban capitalism rivals only Bret Easton Ellis's notorious [novel] American Psycho—only this time, our killer is a real working girl. Corporate space is subverted and the bodies pile up" (Jessica Levin). Office Killer blends Sherman's unique visual imagination with the sensibility of veteran horror director Dario Argento, whose Suspiria, Inferno she credits as an inspiration. Office Killer itself is both horrifying and amusing, and an ironic commentary on the convention of horror films.

After numerous sold-out screenings in January and February, we have been flooded with requests for more of Ray's recently re-released films, including the "Apu Trilogy" which we will be showing later this Spring. This month's program will feature an early masterpiece *The Mirror Room*—made between the second and third parts of the Trilogy—and, from Ray's mid-career, the more obsure but highly praised *The Middleman*.

The Music Room is one of Ray's most important films. "In Ray's extraordinary study of pride carried to extremity" (Pauline Kael), "an elderly Indian aristocrat, having bankrupted his family with a passion for lavish musical evenings performed by the very best musicians, decides he must hold one last concert in his decaying mansion to show the upstart son of a moneylender who is master. The noble but obsessive music lover is one of Ray's most precise and complex portraits, and the final musicale is pure tour-de-force. Slow, rapt and hypnotic, it is a remarkable experience" (Cinematheque Ontario).

THE MIDDLEMAN (JANA-ARANYA) (India, 1975, 122 min.) Cast: Pradip Mukherjee, Staya Banerjee

The Middleman is a highly regarded but lesser known Ray film set amid the social chaos of Calcutta in the 1970s, a period when "Ray became increasely concerned with the impossibility of hope in India. Though pessimistic in the face of the decay and corruption he witnessed, Ray maintained his gently ironic and compassionate view of humanity" (Cinematheque Ontario). A young man graduates from University to find himself among the throngs of the unemployed, and after a long and earnest search for work, he accidently falls into a role of a "middleman" working for a group of extortionists. The film culminates in a crisis of conscience with the young man struggling to maintain his integrity in grim circumstances. "So observantly funny in its detail and so sympathetically engaged with all its characters that the fundamental pessimism of its attitudes become the more melancholy and impressive" (Penelope Houston, Sight & Sound).



Boulder-based experimental filmmaker Phil Solomon will be presenting a program of his award-winning work, including two recent films made in collaboration with Stan Brakhage. Solomon has been making films for over twenty years. His work—known for its highly charged optical-printed, chemically induced, and multiple layered imagery and rhythms—represents some of the best of contemporary experimental film.



His films are profound emotional mediations on imagination and loss. "...As with **Brakhage** one must abandon oneself to the trance-like authority of a **Solomon** film, and be sure-footed enough to follow a structure that relies on overtones as well as melody, on sudden flashes of metaphor as much as narrative line" (Tom Gunning). In 1992 **Stan Brakhage** named *Remains To Be Seen* (First Prize, Oberhausen Short Film Festival, 1990) as one of his top ten films of all time for *Sight & Sound*.

Flat is Beautiful (b&w, video, 50 min., 1998) is an experimental, live-action cartoon using masks, animation, subtitles, drawings, and dramatic scenes to investigate the psychic life of an androgynous eleven-year-old girl. Growing up in a working class neighborhood with her single mother and gay roommate, Taylor confronts the loneliness of living between masculine and feminine in a culture obsessed with defining gender difference. Shifting between black and white film and grainy pixelvision video, Flat is Beautiful explores the internal and external worlds of sad people.

Sadie Benning (whose father, celebrated experimental filmmaker James Benning, will be presenting work in person at Hallwalls on April 23) is the director of eight video works (including Jollies) all produced with a Fisher Price toy video camera. She is also a music video director, film animator, and painter. Her videos have screened extensively in North America, Europe, and Japan.

Way In & Way Out: A March Mini-Festival of New Music

Friday March 20 • 8 pm **WORLD PREMIERE** "Primordial/Lift"

A Composition for Electronic & Acoustic Instruments (1998) by

### **Pauline Oliveros**



Legendary new music pioneer Pauline Oliveros has invited a distinguished ensemble of musicians (including Buffalo's own Tony Conrad) to join her in performing this new work, made possible by a major commissioning grant from The Fromm Music Foundation at Harvard University, with additional support for the Hallwalls presentation provided by The Foundation for Contemporary Performance Arts.

Oliveros based her open-ended score for "Primordial/Lift" on an ancient prophecy foretelling of a shift in frequency within the earth from 8 hertz to 13 hertz, a shift that the instrumentalists will use metaphorically as a basis for their harmonic improvisations. Media and sound artist Andrew Deutsch will convert the signals into video for live projection on a screen behind the players. Ensemble: Pauline Oliveros (expanded accordion), Tony Conrad (violin), Anne Bourne (cello), Alexandria Gelencser (cello), David Grubbs (harmonium), Andrew Deutsch (toy piano & modified television).

Also renowned as a filmmaker and video artist, Tony Conrad has performed on the violin since 1962. A professor of Media Study at UB, he also produces the "School News" bulletin board on TCI Channel 18. His influential series of compositions, Early Minimalism, issued as a boxed CD set on the independent Table of the Elements label, includes performances with his partner, cellist Alexandria Gelencser. Conrad last performed in Buffalo with Chicago-based guitarist and composer David Grubbs in a 1996 concert by Gastr del Sol, of which Grubbs is a founding member. Grubbs was also guitarist and principal songwriter for the influential mid-80s punk band Squirrel Bait, whose two records have recently been reissued. He performs on numerous other recordings, including his own 1997 solo album Banana Cabbage, Potato Lettuce, Onion Orange (Table of the Elements), and on such film and television productions as The United States of Poetry (PBS), Norman & Bruce Yonemoto's Japan in Paris in LA., and Douglas Aitken's film The Diamond Sea, which premiered at the 1997 Whitney Biennial. Anne Bourne is a Toronto-based cellist, composer, and improviser who has recorded with such artists as Fred Frith and Jane Siberry. Last year she collaborated as a singer and cellist on Mychael Dana's score for Atom Egoyan's acclaimed film The Sweet Hereafter, and with Oliveros on the latter's score for the Spanish documentary Paulina! Bourne has studied Deep Listening and worked with Oliveros since 1994. Also a student of Oliveros (and a former Hallwalls staffer), Andrew Deutsch is now Assistant Professor of sound and video at Alfred University and a member of its recently established Institute of Electronic Art. A giant of late 20th-century music, Pauline Oliveros has never sung soprano at the Metropolitan Opera.
