"Altered Egos is about fact and fiction, or fact as fiction. Investigating concerns more typically associated with theater and transvestitism, but not actually either, the visual artists in this exhibition share a desire to reexamine the personality. By imagining themselves (or someone they know) as someone else, they raise and (sometimes, even) answer many questions. Among them: Who are they? Who do they want to be? And why? If each of us as personalities are composed of several different personas, why shouldn't portraiture? Of course it can and does. See for yourself." - Reine Hauser


Altered Egos brings together 22 artists and artist collaboratives from North America and Europe who examine notions of shifting identity. Artists such as Cindy Sherman and Janieta Eyre use photography as a manipulating technique to reinvent themselves in many guises. Sasha YungJu Lee and Randy Moore insert themselves into the media and pop culture; Lee becomes the subject of covers of Vogue, Time and Art in America; and Moore through a multi-media study of himself as the superhero sidekick Robin. Josh Iguchi and Mary Fielding McCleary insert their friends and colleagues into tableaux such as bible stories; while Luis Cruz Azaceta and John Copoulos use themselves as the primary models in their exploration of personal gender transformation. Kenny Schachter and VIROCODE examine personal transformations both humorous and monstrous. This multi-media exhibition will be an exciting examination of these many remarkable artists and of the powers of self-transformation. The exhibition will be accompanied by an illustrated catalogue with essays by Reine Hauser and guest essayist Sylvie Fortin.

Reine Hauser is an independent curator and critic. In the past five years she has curated exhibitions such as *Karel Appel: An Historical Overview* and *Karel Appel: Recent*

As an independent curator, she curated with Janet Henry *Angry Art*, which included work by Leon Golub, David Hammons, Edgar Heap-of-Birds, Howardena Pindell, Christy Rupp, Nancy Spero, Marina Gutierrez, and Mike Glier.

Essayist Sylvie Fortin is the curator at the Ottawa Art Gallery, one of Canada's major public galleries. She has written numerous reviews for such magazines as *Etc. Montréal*, *Inter*, *Noir d'Encre*, *Parachute* and *Parallelogramme* and essays for several exhibition catalogues. She is currently a board member of Oboro and a collaborating editor of *Fuse* magazine. Last year Fortin curated *Bereft* for Hallwalls and the exhibition subsequently traveled to Spaces in Cleveland. She was also part of a project in Prague in the fall of 1996 with the artists collective RESURGENCE.

This exhibition was made possible by a grant for independent curatorial initiatives from the New York State Council on the Arts administered by the Delaware Valley Council on the Arts. Hallwalls was one of three New York State arts organizations (along with CEPA Gallery and the Bronx Council on the Arts) to receive this grant. The exhibition is available for travel to other organizations.

VISITING DESIRE

Dir: Beth B.

Visiting Desire is an entirely original and compelling documentary inspired by one simple premise: people acting out fantasies with a stranger in a bedroom. This is a documentary. There is no script...only five days, twelve people, fourteen encounters. One person sits, waiting on a bed—"The sitter." Another person enters the room — "The visitor." They introduce themselves - a combination of excitement, fear and anticipation are palpable as their fantasies get played out. The results are intimate portraits simultaneously childish, comic, sensually erotic, emotionally shattering and ultimately revealing. The documentary is divided by titles telegraphing the encounters that follow: aggression to innocence; loss of innocence to trust; and control to vulnerability. And while the camera is forgotten, we are offered a glimpse into intimate moments whose privacy is explosively ruptured. Visiting Desire features Lydia Lunch, Kembra Pfahler, Chloe Dzubilo, and a fascinating array of New York characters taking turns as stranger and visitor. A forerunner of the explosive New York New Wave scene of the late 1970's, Beth B has independently produced and directed a series of powerful films, videotapes, and large scale installation pieces.

MEMORIES OF UNDERDEVELOPMENT (Memorias del subdesarrollo)

Memories of Underdevelopment is considered Tomás Gutiérrez Alea's greatest film, a masterwork of both Cuban and Latin American cinema. As the first film from post-revolutionary Cuba to be released in the USA, the film had a widespread impact unequaled in the history of Third World Cinema. It begins in Havana of 1961 and centers on a Europeanized Cuban intellectual, too idealistic to leave for Miami, but too decadent to fit into the new society. Sergio, a bourgeois intellectual who has chosen to remain behind in the new revolutionary Cuba, finds himself ambivalent about the society he sees emerging. "Gutiérrez Alea exposes the angst of his protagonist with the subtlety of Antonioni, as well as the vitality - problems and all— of the new world that devours him in the end." (Toronto International Film Festival 1994). Memories of Underdevelopment is a masterful combination of cinematic artistry, Cuban history and revolutionary ideology. The film will be introduced by Hallwall's artist-in-residence Manuel Piña.

THE UMBRELLAS OF CHERBOURG

Dir: Jacques Demy

France 1964/1996 91 min.


The Umbrellas of Cherbourg is one of the most audacious and colorful musicals of all time. Winner of the Palme D'Or at the 1964 Cannes Film Festival the film received almost universal acclaim when it was first released in 1964. It features a young Catherine Deneuve and Nino Castelnuovo as ill-fated lovers in the tale of a garage mechanic in a port town and the umbrella shopkeeper's daughter he loves. All the dialogue in the film is set to music by Michal Legrand who received three academy award nominations for his score to Umbrellas of Cherbourg and has since become one of the most important names in contemporary music. Jacques Demy's lyrical masterpiece is also celebrated for its breathtaking use of color. But by the midseventies all the existing prints had faded to pink and become badly damaged. The film disappeared and was unavailable for a long time. It took a painstaking restoration of the film's negative undertaken by Demy's widow, French New Wave director Agnès Varda, to reconstruct the film to its original splendor. Since being re-released, the restored version of the film has been enjoying extended runs across the country to packed houses. There is also renewed admiration for Demy, long cast as lightweight (perhaps because he has a fan's, rather than a critic's, sensibility), in comparison to New Wave contemporaries such as Jean-Luc Godard and Francois Truffaut. Of all the New Wave directors who once professed their joy in cinema, Demy remained most faithful to the delights of sight and sound and to the romance of movie iconography.



This powerhouse features Rey Scott's flute and baritone sax joined with John Bacon Jr. and Abdul Quadir on drums, Rodney Appleby, Chris Northington and Greg Piontek on bass. Both composers will present new works written specifically for the ensemble. This ensemble grows out of the musical ideas Rey Scott explores on his latest CD America's Music which is available locally. The arrangement of the instruments allows for multiplicities of rhythms surrounding the reed player who acts as a kind of anchor against the waves of percussion around him. Cornelius Eady is a much celebrated and widely respected poet. Since 1980, he has published five books of poetry: Kartunes, Victims of the Latest Dance Craze (Lamont Prize, 1985), The Gathering of My Name (Pulitzer nomination, 1992), You Don't Miss Your Water, and The Autobiography of a Juke Box. He is a past recipient of fellowships from the NEA and from the Guggenheim, Rockefeller, Woodrow Wilson, and Lila Wallace-Reader's Digest foundations. Among the strengths of Eady's work are his inventive use of blues and popular music traditions and his impeccable sense of phrasing, by turns witty, lyrical, and biting. He has taught, read and conducted workshops at numerous colleges and community centers and is currently Associate Professor of English and Director of The Poetry Center at SUNY Stony Brook.

Patricia Spears Jones is a poet, playwright, and performance artist. After twenty years of publishing extensively in journals and performing throughout the United States, her work has begun to attract the attention it richly deserves. Her play, Mother, commissioned by Mabou Mines, premiered at La Mama in 1994 to great critical acclaim. The Weather That Kills, her first major collection of poetry, was published in 1995 and has been widely and favorably reviewed. "Jones' poetry is a study in conflict, the scales of tradition and experience never quite strike a safe balance... Her voice is... grounded in her rural southern roots, yet built on over twenty years in New York." Speaking as a feminist, a woman of color, and a writer-activist, she admits: "I like contention!" Well known as a very dynamic reader, this will be her first Buffalo appearance in many years.
